

Volunteering at Esperanza Verde in the Amazon of Peru

Help construct the first wildlife rescue centre in Ucayali, Peru and conserve the rainforest.

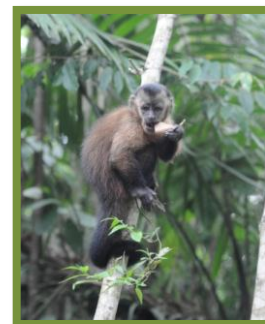
If you are interested in volunteering at Esperanza Verde, here you will find information on what is expected of you as a volunteer and what you can expect at Esperanza Verde.

What kind of work will I have to do?

The work at Esperanza Verde is varied. As we are in the start of the project we are mainly occupied with constructions to get ready to receive animals.

Several enclosures for animals have been constructed and there is always more to be done in constructions. Other work as in construction, involves reforestation, planting seeds and seedlings at the tree nursery, planting fruit trees for the future animals in the rescue centre, maintenance of the paths.

As soon as we are able to receive animals, animal caretaking, including feeding and cage cleaning, will be a daily activity.



We are also interested in people who can do an inventory of the various species of fauna and/or flora existing on the land. As well there is also the possibility of helping out at the local primary or secondary school, teaching English, environmental classes, sports, or assisting generally. Both involve a longer stay (min. 3 months) and you need to have some experience.

What are the living conditions like?

Once you are here, you will stay in one of the rooms of the volunteer house. The rooms have two or three beds each. We provide sheets, a pillow, and a blanket. Mosquito nets are mostly available.

There is a bathroom in the house with a toilet, shower and cement table for washing clothes. There is a water system, which provides water for the house, kitchen and some cages. Water is freely available, with filtered drinking water in the house and kitchen.

Only cold running water is available for showering. The house is near a stream where you also can bath and wash. There is a nice small waterfall with a water basin on the land, and if you like swimming you can go swim in the river Aguaytia.

While walking through the forest you might encounter some mosquitoes, but there are hardly any near the house (only from February to mid March there are more). During day there are some sand flies.

There is no electricity at Esperanza Verde. Evening light is by candle light and some small solar powered lights. Some of the cooking will be done on a fire with wood, but there is also a gas stove with an oven provided in the kitchen.

The shopping for our food will mostly be done once or twice a week in the town of Curimana (1 hour away). The food is very basic and includes items as pasta, rice, eggs, flour, powdered milk and fresh vegetables and fruit (depending on what is available). As spices (other than garlic, salt, pepper and oregano) are expensive and difficult to obtain, you may want to bring a few of your own favorite spices. From Monday to Friday lunch is prepared, for the rest we prepare all our meals ourselves (taking turns). You will be working 5-6 days a week. In the weekend normally everybody has the weekend off, except for helping with the daily chores like cooking and taking care of the resident animals on one of the days. The day generally starts at 07:30 and ends at five with a lunch break from 12:00 to 13:00.



Do I have to pay for anything?

You must arrange your own transportation. You will have to pay for your flight to Peru as well as transportation to Esperanza Verde. For your stay at Esperanza Verde we ask 210 Nuevo Peruvian Sol (also payable in USDollars) per week, which covers food and lodging and includes a contribution for materials for the continued development of the centre. If you want to do a special project here as part of your study or for your internship as a student, you would pay 280 Nuevo Peruvian Sol (or in US\$) a week. Most of the time during the week will then be reserved for you to work on your project. Items of a personal nature (i.e. stamps, film, post cards, batteries, flashlight, and treats) are all at your own expense.

The easiest and cheapest way to get Peruvian Soles is in Peru itself, at the airport in Lima (changing from USD or EURO, or from an ATM) or from any ATM in the city. There are no ATM's in Curimana, the closest to Esperanza Verde to get money is in Pucallpa, about 3-4 hours away. There you can exchange money or get money from an ATM.

If you want to go to Bello Horizonte (the nearby local village) or Curimana you will need to arrange and pay for your own transportation. A canoe to the other side of the river to Bello Horizonte costs 1 Nuevo Sol (5 minutes). From there you have to take a (motor) taxi for 7 Nuevo Sol (about 1 hour) to the riverbank where again it costs 1 Nuevo Sol to cross the river to arrive in Curimana.

If you want to go to Pucallpa you can take a collective taxi from Curimana for 18 Nuevo Sol and it takes about 2 hours.

Do I need to speak Spanish?

Having an intermediate knowledge of Spanish always comes in handy, as it will make it easier to communicate with local people and therefore make your stay here more enjoyable. However, it is not a requirement.

How do I get there?

Esperanza Verde is located in the Northern Amazon region of Peru, in the Ucayali region. From Lima you can either go first to Pucallpa, by bus or plane. The information below gives you all the details, which might seem more complicated than it really is. Many have taken the different routes and have not found any trouble taking them.

BY PLANE

Lima→Pucallpa

Pucallpa's airport is 5 km northwest of town. 'Lan Peru' and 'Star Peru' both have daily flights to and from Lima. When you arrive by plane in Pucallpa you have to travel further by taxi (see below further travelling details 'by bus: Pucallpa→Esperanza Verde'). For schedules and departures and prices, it is best to check on their website or at the airport.

BY BUS

Lima→Esperanza Verde :

You can travel more or less directly from Lima to Esperanza Verde.

You take a bus from Lima which travels to Pucallpa. We recommend traveling with either Turismo Central (Avenida Juna Pizarro 442, La Victoria in Lima) or Leon de Huanuco (office on Av. 28 de Julio 1520, La Victoria, Lima). Both offices can be reached within walking distance of each other. They leave at 13:30, and it takes about 20-30 min from Miraflores in Lima. Best is to be half an hour in advance to buy the ticket. They have 2 floors, top floor for 81 resp. 70 soles, and lower floor for 121 resp. 90 soles (more comfortable chairs). Tell them when you buy the ticket you want to get off at Neshuya. Also tell this again to the person taking your backpack in the bus, so he won't put it all the way in the back. You would arrive in Neshuya around 6 am the next day and from there get a collective taxi at the streetcorner to Curimana (should be 10 soles, you might have to wait a bit as they will only leave if there are enough passengers). Let them drop you at the port (el puerto-Bigote) where you can cross the river to the other side to get a collective taxi to Bello Horizonte.

Ask to be dropped off at Cesars house (casa de Don Cesar) in Bello Horizonte. If we know when to expect you, we will have a look at a certain time, and latest will check again at 5 pm. If we are not there, ask anybody at the riverbank (also canoes passing by) if they can cross you (cost 1 sol for crossing pp and 2 Sol total pp for bringing you till the house).

This way you don't have to go first to Pucallpa and then take partly the same route back.

Lima→Pucallpa

Another option is to travel first to Pucallpa. When you arrive by bus in Pucallpa it might be best to spend the night there as the trip by bus is very long and you might not make it to Esperanza Verde the same day.

A direct bus to and from Lima (about 70-121 Soles) takes about 18 hours in the dry season, in the wet season it can take 20 hours. We recommend traveling either with Turismo Central Turismo Central (Avenida Juna Pizarro 442, La Victoria in Lima) or Transmar (office on corner of AV. 28 de Julio, La Victoria, close to Turismo Central). Both offices can be reached within walking distance of each other.

Pucallpa → Esperanza Verde

First you have to travel to Curimana. Take a motortaxi to the office of Turismo Curimana (Avenida Centenario) or Nuevo Curimana (Av. 7 de Junio) in Pucallpa. They have collective taxis going to Curimana. Both offices are near each other - just tell the motortaxi driver where you want to go, he will drop you at one of them. The car will leave as soon as there are 4 passengers. If there is no car ready to go at one office you can try at the other one. Sometimes you have to wait for an hour, in worst case two. The taxi will take you for 18 Nuevo Sol to Curimana.

When you arrive in Curimana (after about 2 hours) let them drop you at the port (el puerto-Bigote) where you can cross the river (1 Sol pp) to the other side to get a collective taxi (7 Sol pp) to Bello Horizonte.

Ask to be dropped off at Cesars house (casa de Don Cesar) in Bello Horizonte. If we know when to expect you, we will have a look at a certain time, and latest will check again at 5 pm. If we are not there, ask Don Cesar if he can cross you (cost 2 Sol pp bringing you till the house).

If you start early in the morning (around 7 am there are often cars) you can make it to Esperanza Verde before lunch. The latest to go from Pucallpa is 3 pm, if you want to make it to us in the same day. It might work a bit later, but you might not be able to find a car from Curimana to Bello Horizonte. But you could take the risk, and if not, you can spend the night in Curimana (hotel Moreno is ok, they have internet as well).

Staying in Lima

In case you stay overnight in Lima, Pay Purix Hotel is a good hotel which is near the airport for 18 US\$ a night. You can book a room over internet (info@paypurix.com).

If you want to stay further away from the Airport, a nice hotel you can find in Miraflores, Friends House in Jose Gonzales 427 (20-35 soles per person, incl. breakfast).

Staying in Pucallpa:

If you want a more homey feeling, stay with Maria, who was our neighbour in Pucallpa. She rents rooms for 5 Nuevo soles. She also runs an internet shop, so you can email home that you arrived safe. She has very basic rooms, and cold showers (it will be hard to find hot ones anywhere in Pucallpa). She can even pick you up from the airport if you want to if she knows

in time of your arrival date. She also can help you out with any information you need about getting around in Pucallpa. You can find her on the corner of the 8th block of Jr. Arenal ('locutorio'), nr. 803. On the otherside there is a little shop called 'bodega Martita'. It is not in the centre, but by motortaxi you can be there in 5 minutes. In Pucallpa it is important to keep your belongings close to your body - don't leave them anywhere, and always be careful at night. As a foreigner you are an easy target for pickpockets, just like in any big city.

You can also stay at Hotel Arequipo, in the street El Progreso. It is more luxurious (tv and wireless) and therefore a bit expensive (105 soles for a double room), but it is in the centre, it is clean and the people are friendly.

A more budget but clean hotel in the centre is Hospedaje Peru en the street Raimondi 639. It does not have wireless and costs are around 25 soles per person. On the opposite site the hotel Barbtur is also a good option, with wireless and costs are 30 soles for a single room with private shower.

Do I need any vaccinations?

For this information, it is best to contact the travel advisory clinic in your country. You should be up to date on all your regular vaccinations (tetanus, diphtheria, polio, and hepatitis). It is always best to consult the health professionals in your country for the latest information. In this region there is no malaria, so you don't need any anti-malaria pills.

A Yellow fever vaccination is required for entering the Amazon area, they might check this upon your arrival, so always have your vaccination papers with you.

How long can I stay in Esperanza Verde?

The minimum stay is three weeks. There is no maximum stay. As long as you like to stay and work hard, and are okay with all the conditions, you are welcome to stay as long as you want. The longer you can stay the more interesting it can be for you, as you get to know the work, surroundings, and the animals and people a lot better.

In Peru you normally get a 90 days visitor's visa upon entry in the country. If you already know you want to stay longer in Peru, you can ask, upon entering the country (do this before they stamp your passport), for the maximum stay of 180 days.

It might be possible to prolong from 90 days to 180 days at the Immigration office in Lima. Otherwise and as well after a stay of 180 days, you have to travel to one of the borders, go out for some hours, and then you can come in again. They will give you another 90 days, or, if you ask, 180. A volunteer visa does not exist in Peru.

What should I bring?

You will need loose fitting, comfortable work clothes. Do not spend a lot of money on special safari type clothing as you most likely will be throwing out all your work clothes when you are finished volunteering at Esperanza Verde (they will get stained and moldy). It is preferable to wear long pants while working. There are some biting types of insects here (sometimes sand flies during the day and some mosquitoes at night). In addition to clothes, you need rubber boots (this is the rainforest and it does get very muddy, you can buy boots in Pucallpa for about 20 soles), as well as some type of rain poncho. When you decide you are coming, ask us if we have some boots in your size, so you don't have to buy them. Crocs are handy to have as well; you can buy them easily and cheap in Lima or Pucallpa. As we hardly use mosquito nets, they are mostly available if you want one. Since there is no electricity, a flashlight is a necessity. Entertainment is up to you. There is time for reading, playing cards, listening to music. If you wish to do anything like this, bring it with you (along with batteries, but please take them with you when you leave). Feel free to bring your own spices, and cook book. Life at Esperanza Verde is very simple.



How do I communicate with my friends and family? How do I communicate with Esperanza Verde?

You can e-mail home from Peru. There are a lot of internet cafes in Lima. In Pucallpa, there are several places with computers for e-mailing. Service is might be slow and not always working, but it is available.

In Curimana at the hotel Moreno there are several computers with internet (a very slow connection). There is a phone in the village Bello Horizonte but it is not easy, as it works with solar panel and it has a complicated system to phone elsewhere. But is possible to make an international phone call from here, it is expensive and only for a couple of minutes. If you want to call longer it is best to go to Curimana.
